Dr. Glenn Frank, university president, in his only comment following the release of the committee's findings, declared that the report contained "nothing new." He declined to make further comment until he had read the entire report carefully and added that even then he was not certain that he would make a public reply.

No specific faculty number was shown at the investigation nor was any other individual or society the subject of attack, the senators dis-

closed. Regents of the university were urged to maintain constant vigilance against anti-American activities in order to restore the university's name as a "truly American institution of high ideals and purposes."

The report was signed by all five committee members, including three Democrats, one Republican, and one Progressive.

be required to attend chapel or church services on half the Sundays of the college year.  
When the cutting student has fallen behind academically or has violated other rules of discipline, "disciplinary action" will be taken, the dean stated. Princeton university is one of the few of the nation's colleges or universities using the "honor cut" system. At Duke university, students are at-

### lowed five cuts in each 3-hour subject

each semester. Students on the Dean's List, however, are permitted unlimited cuts until, as in the Princeton system, their scholastic average proves unsatisfactory. In order to be placed on the Dean's List at Duke, a student must have a "B" average and must be a Junior. The Princeton system is, in effect, a Dean's list for all students of all classes who do not "fall behind academically."
