Will Duke's gridiron team be able to break the line that South Carolina seems to hold over them in their conference start tomorrow afternoon? Although the Blue Devils have only met the Gamecocks twice before they were walked both times and they will be out fighting for one more tomorrow. The two previous defeats—those many times connected with them—the first reverse in 1950 was the only one that Jimmy Dancy's team suffered that season. The following year the Gamecocks gave Wallace Wade's first Duke cinder a beating. Incidentally, this is one of the few defeats, if not the only one, that Coach Wade has not avenged since he has been on the Duke coaching staff.

### Gamecocks Near S. C. Foe

The Birds will also be fighting to inaugurate their admission to the Southern conference with a victory for this is their first year as a member and also their first conference game. The Gamecocks will be fighting for more than glory—the one for revenge—the other for recognition as a likely title contender.

### McCallister Makes Debut

And the Birds will be fighting for still another victory, to make Coach Don McCallister's debut as a Southern conference winner a success. McCallister came to South Carolina this year with only the highest praise and is rated as one of the country's outstanding young coaches. This marks his first year as a collegiate coach, as his previous coaching experience was limited to high school coaching ranks. It was in this field that he gained national recognition, turning out national high school champions at Miami and Toledo. He is sure to feel right at home here, for he is well acquainted with two Durham high school coaches and with Carl Voyles, Jerry Grand, and Bill Chambers of the Blue Devil staff.

### Much Expected of Clary

So far Coach McCallister has more than lived up to his reputation because he has turned out a smart, clean-looking eleven with a dangerously fast set of backs headed by the much talked about Willem Clary. In their opening clash against Erskine Saturday Clary roared off several long runs and is expected to keep the Birds right in the thick of things in tomorrow's scrap.

So a word to the wise is sufficient. My pick is Duke in their opening home stand but I am not spotting them any points. Tomorrow's tilt is going to turn into a battle between two sets of very fast backs with plenty of long runs and all kinds of standing in line and feeling for choice seats.

The smallest football squad in the recent history of Backdoor university reported to Coach Mylin this fall. Only 27 men came out to drill at the end of the first week's practice.

## Wademen Set For Battle as Big Joe Cardwell Returns to Devil Lineup For Game With South Carolina Team

With only a day remaining before the Blue Devil grid machine bowls the top of their Southern conference football campaign, in their battle with the South Carolina Gamecocks in the Duke stadium tomorrow afternoon, their hopes are greatly heightened by the announcement that Big Joe Cardwell would again be in the starting lineup. Cardwell, tipping the scales at 215 pounds, is the heavyweight on the Devil's roster and is a bulwark of strength against the repeatedly dangerous offensive attack of the Birds. Joe's tackle, who has been greatly handicapped so far this season by a serious stomach condition, will probably start at either the guard or tackle position for Tom Powers.

### Probable Lineup

The remainder of the starting eleven will probably be the same as that against Wake Forest last Saturday, with West, Tallaferra or Liska at end, Hiding or Brannan at tackle, Hiding or Brannan at guard, Hensel or Hackney at center, and the rest of the team as in the previous lineup.

### Drill on Pass Defense

Coach Wade and his assistants have worked their gridiron hard during the past week polishing up the rough spots that cropped out in the previous tilt last Saturday, paying particular attention to the blocking and pass defense. The departments of the game seemed a little weak at times in the Devil's opening tilt that will have to be greatly improved if the Wademen entertain any hopes of spending their conference race with a clean slate. The Gamecocks are expected to have quite an aerial assault, although they had no occasion to use it when they ran roughshod over Erskine last Saturday to the tune of a 35 to 0 rout.

With all of their hard practice of the past week, however, the Blue Devil squad is in top shape, and will enter tomorrow's game with no ine-

Last semester averages released from the deans' offices revealed conflicting results on the east and west campuses.
