"We will have to come to terms then," he added with a little smile. "The Italian troops went up to Adria, Alaska. They won't have to."

Loebelt was asked about the theory that Mussolini brought about the war because he was on his last leg and wanted to glorify the people behind him.

"There's absolutely nothing in it," he replied vehemently. "Never in my history have the people supported any ruler the way the Italian people support Mussolini. He can remain their ruler as long as he wants to go."

But in the next breath the native Italian predicted the end of Mussolini's reign as a dictator.

"However," he wouldn't surprise me," he declared, "if after this expedition is over, Mussolini resigned and turned the government over to General Balbo, whom he sent to take charge of the African colonies, Mussolini believes in youth, and I think he wants a young man to step in soon and take his place."
