**LEAGUE PENALTY PLAN COMPLETE SOON; HOPE GONE FOR RAPID PACE**

League Penalties Committee at Geneva Plans to Enforce Third in Penalty Plan Today; To Boycott Products PARTIES READY TO MAKE PLANS

Negotiations Likely To Be Held Soon; Some Members Make Reservations as to Penalties

By WALTER CARROLL (Duke Press Staff Correspondent) (Copyright 1955 by United Press) GENEVA, Nov. 1.—(U.P.)—Hope for peace negotiations with the League of Nations leaders put their strongest emphasis on immediate, final settlements.

The League's general staff of 18 nations and the final penalties committee will meet tonight to complete final details of step three of the peace plan and make final arrangements for its enforcement next day after the conference.

The League will impose boycott on nations which lack permanent members of its own. Petroleum was omitted from the general boycott because it is needed by the United States, a non-member, is the biggest producer and exporter of oil.

The situation as regards the possibility of peace negotiations with Italy to be on an Ethiopia, and the League's conference economic war was held today.

Ready To Talk All parties to the dispute are ready to negotiate at any time, but there has been absolutely no approach to the League of Nations. The League has been found to be a force that will permit negotiations except in the event of a total breakdown.

It was indicated that, nearly all League members would be ready on the selected date to impose the penalties. Some one made a statement which it was feared might encourage others. Most of the reservation were minor or technical ones. ## ADMINISTRATION COURTNEY TAKES PRESSES ACTION SOPH ELECTIONS ON TRADE PACTS BY SLM MARGIN

Washington Officials Pushing Negotiations For Reciprocal Trade Agreements

By HENRY C. MORSE (Duke Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(U.P.)—Under the impetus given by world opinion, the State Department has announced that it will negotiate a trade pact with the League of Nations.

The pact, which is expected to be signed by the end of the year, will provide for a half-dozen new reciprocal trade agreements as a feature of the New Deal recovery program.

Negotiations for treaties with Spain, Netherlands, and Switzerland are being completed. Negotiations with France and Finland are in an active stage. Negotiations with Canada are expected to be resumed actively in the immediate future.

The trade treaties now in effect with other countries are being reviewed. The State Department is expected to announce the results of their operation.

# MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY BUILDS SOLAR TOWER

## Largest Largest of Its Kind in World Being Constructed at Lake Michigan, Near Pontiac, Mich.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 9.—(UP)—The third largest solar tower in the world is being constructed by the University of Michigan at Lake Michigan, near Pontiac, Mich.

The tower, which will be 100 feet above the ground and 30 feet high, will be second only to two towers at the University of California, 100 and 80 feet in height, respectively.

The purpose of the tower is to show the light of the sun's rays down a long tube to a metal mirror at the base of the tower, which will reflect a spot of light 100 to 150 feet.

The revolving specter is then reflected back up the tower to a special photo-thermograph at the peak, which will record the length of the spectrum.

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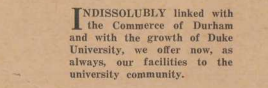
