Those schools which have been invited to send seventeen women each to represent them are: Peace, Meredith, St. Mary's, Greensboro college, Woman's College of N. C. C., and Duke's college at Chapel Hill.

When the representatives arrive, they will be divided into four teams, each team wearing a different color, red, green, yellow, or blue. A tentative program has been drawn up as follows: 2:00 p. m., mass games and relay; to get acquainted; 2:30, tennis, two volleyball games, hockey, soccer; 3:45, swimming, informal tennis, relay; 4:00, etc.; 4:35 free swim; 4:40, 5:00, tea for everyone.

two schools. This was the first break-away from the traditional Rugby South of the Potomac.

The Trinity Academy of that year records that "Trinity had sent a challenge to Chapel Hill and demanded to know what they would do. Evidently the Carolina eleven accepted the challenge and the game was played on Thanksgiving Day, 1860.

The Southern conference championship was won by the Trinity eleven in '91 in which year Carolina fell before the Devil onslaught, 6 to 4.

The following year Trinity lost to the Tar Heels, 24 to 6, to come back the following year with a 6 to 4 win. Carolina took the Blue Devils into camp in 1894, following which there was a 24-year period during which football was banned from Trinity until 1918, when it was revived.

In 1893, the year of Duke's great team, the Tar Heels were taken over by the second team, winning 10 to 0, but last year the Carolina eleven won by a single touchdown and extra point.

VINDICATION FOR ALLEGED EVILS PLEA OF EDITOR

Douglas Freeman Denounces "Sever Reelers" Before Library Meeting at Duke

Striking a blow at "sever reels" and issuing a call for vindication, Dr. Douglas Freeman, editor of the *Durham News-Leader*, regretted the previous misrepresentation of southern literature, in a speech at the first annual dinner meeting of the Friends of the Duke University Library.

"Our great mother tongue needs to have its dignity and splendor restored, and to show its own frustration and inability to market anything else. They would not be so confident by doing things lawfully, so they had to make a noise to be heard."

Dr. Freeman declared that whatever charge comes in southern literature is bound to be for the better. "Let us hope that it will be upward in morals, upward in art form. When literature comes to be beautiful it comes to appeal to the highest in us. Why fill the air with sound?"

The distinguished Virginia editor and author, winner of this year's Pulitzer prize for his biography of Robert E. Lee, not only arranged the group of novelists which he would not be reading merely, but presented the group, but analyzed the causes for their rise.

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SKINNER SCORES WITH AUDIENCE HERE LAST NIGHT

Famous Entertainer Well Received With Character Skits Before Big Crowd
