DUKE LIBRARIES ADD 6,470 NEW VOLUMES

Only Five Universities Exceed Trinity in Appropriations

Statistics released by J. P. Brundage, Duke university librarian, reveal that the libraries have acquired about 4,470 volumes since June 30, the general library acquiring 20,000 volumes, the Women's College 20,000, the Law Library 214, and the Medical Library approximately 204. This makes a total of 48,720 volumes now available in the four university libraries.

Duke's libraries were exceeded in appropriations last year by only five other universities, namely, Chicago, Columbia, Yale, Michigan, and Illinois. There were added 32,180 volumes, which were bought with funds received from the University and from the student library fees. At the present time the Duke library is the largest university library in the Southeast, and is second to that of the University of Texas in the South.

Use Of Educational Films Increases In High Schools

American Council on Education Establishes Clearing House For Information and Classification of Pictures; \$100,000,000 Market For Film Industry

Use of motion pictures in education, led back five years by reduced school budgets, is now going ahead apace, and rapidly expanding development of the almost limitless possibilities in this field is expected in the 1937-38 season on the basis of plans formulated and surveys made in the past year.

A potential market of upwards of \$100,000,000 annually for the industry in the adoption of sound motion pictures for use in classrooms alone is being considered a conservative figure by authorities in the field of education.

Present activity in the field is in two distinct but related phases, each with important bearings on the future of the industry. First is the equipping of schools with projectors and sound apparatus for the showing of pictures reproduced especially for visual education. An extensive library of such pictures including travelogues, scientific, technical subjects and similar topics, is already in existence and will be substantially increased. Visual instruction is being adopted by educators in increasing numbers as its invaluable ally, and its importance is
