# NOTRE DAME TRUSTEES REPORT SMALL LOSSES

Net Shrinkage of Endowment Is Less Than One Per Cent

NOTRE DAME, Ind., Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Board of Lay Trustees of the University of Notre Dame reports a net shrinkage of less than one per cent in the principal of endowment funds during the past seven years.

Two years ago, with all the depression losses issued over, the shrinkage of principal was estimated at 13 per cent, but rehabilitation of securities led by the board has brought the principal to 99 per cent of the actual subscriptions.

Byron V. Kinsley, Chicago lawyer and president of the board, announced that the surrender by the university of a portion of the interest due from the board last year to 100 per cent of the money originally advanced.

# INCREASED COLLEGE ENROLLMENTS NOTED

Upward Trend in Attendance Taken as Assurance of American Business Increase

NEW YORK, N. Y., (AP)—Perhaps it is too early to say that the country is back again, but judgment from the large gains in enrollment in most of the universities and colleges throughout the country it is well to note the comeback road.

The 14 southern schools in the table, too, showed a sharp upward rise—82 per cent. Only two of the colleges in the group, University of West Virginia and Randolph Macon, reported slight tapering in attendance.

Eastern colleges and universities, presumably because of limited enrollments in many, did not exhibit such a marked trend. The 54 per cent rise, however, is not a bad record.

Of the 41 eastern schools, only six slipped from last year's level. Registrars and administrators from coast to coast attribute the new "high" to improved economic conditions. The registrar at Antioch college, for instance, says:

"We have fewer students on the ragged edge financially this year than we have had for some time."

In fact, it actually, one college accounts for its decreased enrollment in the new prosperity.

"For the first time in recent years a considerable number of girls have withdrawn their applications because they have decided to attend private colleges," states Mrs. Mary B. J. Lehn, registrar at Hunter college.

None of the registrars believe that the N. Y. A. students' aid has in itself increased the enrollment. Only six of the 80 schools it even a modest claim, responsible for as much as half of the increase. Consensus is displayed in this statement by Alan Bright of Carnegie Institute of Technology:

"The increase this year, in my opinion, was brought by improved financial conditions at home and was not materially affected by NYA. As the NYA assistance was available last year."

"I think, however, that the NYA has been very helpful and has set the economic problems of many of our students."

people in meeting these situations. Axioms are not created, for action alone tend toward making martyrs of these individuals, and although the Scandinavian governments are perfectly aware of Russian and German propaganda within their borders, they rely upon an intelligence among their people which will make them realize the advantage of living under the present system.

Voluntary, non-political cooperation is the third feature of the spirit of the Scandinavian nations, Dr. Stratton said. He touched upon the benefits of cooperatives in selling, buying, and manufacturing, and pointed to the international cooperation among the four northern neighbors, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, and Finland. He made special note of their cordial feeling toward the neutral states of the World War including Holland, Belgium, Switzerland, and Spain until recently, and also spoke of a similar cordiality toward Great Britain.

Dr. Stratton mentioned prominently the attitude of the Scandinavian territory toward the much-discussed League of Nations. In spite of numerous disappointments, Dr. Stratton said, these nations have maintained an "unbroken, undiminished loyalty" to the League, based upon the belief that in its functions lies the only way out of international entanglements.

He said that the Scandinavian policy of sticking by the League has come from a sentiment that regards the League as the only means of safety, and a desire to see that the power of the League shall not be used in a partisan spirit.
