by filibustering. After much effort he gave up and the bill passed.

His best known position is that of chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, which he has held for the last few years. During his two terms at Washington, the progressive Republican has been concerned with many other things, such as road food problems, the extension of the powers of the Federal Trade Commission, and the banking situation.

Before the recent presidential election, he was often mentioned as a possible successor to the Republican ticket. He himself favored the nomination of ex-Governor Winant of New Hampshire, during the first Roosevelt administration he was outspoken in his criticism of the S.C.A. in general and the Code administration in particular. Senator Nye has often suggested that Long, ATU, should call a "real" disunion conference. On several recent occasions, he has affirmed that the war is greater danger than it was thirty days before the Great War.
