Battle Of South Ends In Uninteresting Tie

SATURDAY'S GAME WAS disappointing not only because it settled nothing, but also because it was generally dull and uninteresting. After a first quarter thrash by the Vols, the game settled down to a rather poor punting duel. There were moments of brilliant blocking and Wood, Hackney, and Tipton got off one or two line runs, but by and large the 36,000 patrons shouldn't have been bluffed if their thoughts turned to the World Series instead of the Battle of the South.

One very unpleasant feature of the game was the punting of both teams. Wood, a brilliant runner and punter, looked very poor as a kicker. Tipton, usually a fine punter, wasn't up to his usual standard, although he got off one or two long bores. Hargy and Cagelo both looked better than Wood when hitting the pike. Duke had a considerable edge on distance, and time and again gained yardage on the exchange of kicks. This was, rather because of Wood's poor kicking however than because of any brilliance on the Devil's part.

Herb Hudgins played a great game all the way through. Carl Vopien, Duke end coach, has been quoted as saying that if Hudgins had started at end instead of in the backfield, he would have been an All-American. He that it may be, played a wonderful game, both defensively and offensively. The Vols soon realized that they had little to gain around his end and contented their power on the other side of the line where they found a better reception.

Back For Homecoming
THE HOMEcoming CONFEST brought former Duke stars back to the campus in dozens. Lee Parker, left tackle from the American League baseball season, held the lines during the game. Max Power and his boss, Horace Henderson, Elmo mentors, were in attendance. Horace announced the second half of the ball game over the public address system and did good job. Jim Johnston, captain of the 1935 eleven, and little Red Hume, center of the same club, also witnessed the game.

Yanks Show Batting Power To Win Series From Giants

World baseball champions for the second successive year, the New York Yankees again demonstrated their superiority over the New York Giants when they captured the world series with the loss of only a single game, and that to be the score of the Giant staff, King Carl Hubbell.

Behind the superb flinging of early season "Lerry" Gomez, who was easily the hero of the classic, Charley Ruffing, and Monte Pearson, combined with the magnificent feat of performance in errorless fashion throughout the five games, the Yanks showed no mercy in subduing their rivals from across the Harlem river.

Yanks Take Over
The first game, played at the Yankee Stadium, saw Gomez lead Hubbell 8-1. The Giants scored their lone tally in the fifth inning when Rippie scored while the Yanks were completing a double play.

This seemed to create the ice of the home forces for in the next games, the famed Yankee power turned on Hubbell's successors, Gurnett and Coffman, for a total of seven runs. No less than thirteen men batted during this terrific outburst, and the looked for "pitcher's battle" was over.

Tom Lauerer, veteran Yankee second-baseman was responsible for the eighth-run of the series with one aboard in the seventh inning.

The following afternoon, Bill Terry started Cliff Melton, a rookie right-hander who won 20 games during the regular campaign. He met the same fate as Hubbell, however, and by exactly the same score, 8-1. He lasted only four innings, for when the last four men in the Yankee lineup reached him for base-hits in the fifth, his tenure on the mound was at an end. This did not halt the bombardment, however, for the Nappert Rifles turned their guns on his successor, Dick Coffman for six runs in

A's To Face Duke Batsmen In Game Here This Spring

Combs Mack Philadelphia Athletics will meet Jack Combs' Duke baseball team this spring in Combs Park in an exhibition game, coach Combs announced today. It will be the first time that any major league baseball team has come to Combs Park for an exhibition contest.

Former Duke Stars
The Athletics number several former Duke stars in their lineup. Wayne Ambler, captain and second baseman for last year's Duke nine. Stan Parker, outfielder of the same team, and Bill Werber, Duke third-sacker of several years ago are all playing in the Philadelphia infield. Parker shifted to shortstop after joining the Athletics this spring. Chubby Dean, who starred at Duke as a freshman three years ago and then went to the Athletics as a first baseman, will be used exclusively as a left-handed pitcher next year by Combs Mack.

The game with the Athletics, to be played at the Philadelphia stadium, is the way north after spring training in Florida, will be the fourth exhibition game played by Combs' Duke team against professional clubs.
