## Administration To Comment Soon On Faculty's Dismissal

Flowers Statement Expected; W. A. Tyree Says Nothing Interview Bryson; Robert's Are Out

Dr. Robert L. Flowers, vice-president in charge of the business division, and Mr. W. A. Tyree, superintendent of East campus buildings, would make no comment today on the recent dismissal of Chester W. Wilson from the East campus police force.

The "Chief" was fired after allegedly refusing to lead over money received from North Carolina as compensation for injuries sustained while he was on duty here in August, 1936.

Dr. Flowers indicated that he would make a statement shortly, possibly tomorrow.

Judge Bryson Comments  
Judge T. D. Bryson, attorney to the university, who was connected with the case when the Chief was injured and when he applied for compensation, in Raleigh, signed last night on the legal aspects of the situation, but said he had no knowledge of the dismissal of the Chief.

Mr. Bryson said that the university lawyer had been in the newspaper about the actual dismissal.

Meanwhile, with officers in the administration apparently studying the case with a view to making a statement, the dismissal of the Chief was reported to be creating in practically all of the houses on the East campus. Typical among these was the petition circulated in Bassett House, signed last night by thirty co-eds out of the 110 living in the house, which read:

"We, the undersigned, are in full support of the dismissal of Chester Wilson as Chief of the East campus grounds."

W. A. Tyree, who dismissed Chief Wilson, was asked for a comment yesterday, and issued the following statement: "Any statement or discussion of this case is not to come from the university's staff."

Dr. Bryson, interviewed in his office in the law school yesterday afternoon, said: "I have no source of knowledge as to recent developments in the case. I am not connected with the case, and have no comment on the events preceding the discharge of Chief by Tyree."

When the Chief was injured, Judge Bryson said, the university paid full hospital expenses and medical bills, and paid him his salary in full while he was disabled. After he had recovered, Judge Bryson said, a representative of the Duke Legal Aid Clinic represented Wilson in his claim before the North Carolina Industrial Compensation Commission.

A committee of three, appointed by the Industrial Commission, was declared that Wilson's earning capacity had been reduced.
