Blue Devil Pugs Face Gamecocks Away Tomorrow

Warrenmen Try To West Second Win Of Season From Carolinians

Rager to continue the winning ways they started by chipping up a 2-1 victory over Appalachian State before the holidays. Coach Add Warren's Blue Devils leave for Columbia, S. The next four years he spent mostly at the A.B. degree from Washington and Lee, and in the meantime he was a letter in the court game and on the gridiron.

In his senior year, 1924, he was chosen fullback on the mythical A.S. Southern grid team of that championship and received mention on many All-Americans. During the winter break, of course, at his other main interest, basketball, and 1927-28 was his starting at guard for the Georgetown team for two years.

After graduating with his degree, he remained at the Virginia school for another year as a coach and as a letterman. (Continued on page 1)

Cameron Enters Ninth Year As Blue Devil's Cage Mentor

Duke's Court Teams Reach Conference Finals Four Times Since 1929

Basketball coach Edmund McCullough Cameron, "Baldy" to you, now in his ninth year as leader of Duke's cage teams. And judging from the record compiled by these outcasts during the last eight years, he has certainly been successful in this difficult task.

In 1928, his first year at the helm of a Duke court team, the Duke Devils lost the fight of the Southern conference tournament. Again in 1930, which is generally classed as his first season in charge, when Duke lost only 2 out of 20 games, they reached the finals, and for the third and fourth years in '31 and '32, and '33 they reached the semi-finals, but last year were eliminated in the first round by the champion North Carolina, 34-36.

Warns Profs Not To Be Dogmatic

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—(AP)—Teaching controversial topics requires of the teacher an honest respect for the student's ability to make critical judgments for himself, according to Dr. Roy W. Halse, professor of social studies and education in the New Jersey State Teachers College.

"You are there to encourage and guide the student in his inquiry," he said in addressing the Missouri State Teachers Association. "You are to condemn the superficial and command the well-reasoned. You are to be a teacher, not a propagandist."

Dr. Theodore Green, Princeton university art critic, buttressed his own criticism on "Basic Principles of Art Criticism."

Science Advances In Atom Research

CHICAGO, Ill.—(AP)—Two Washington University (St. Louis, Mo.) scientists have announced that they are a step nearer solving the mystery of the atom.

They have succeeded in measuring the speed of the fast-traveling electron within the atom. Because it was impossible to measure the electron's speed directly, the two physicists, Dr. A. L. Hughes and Dr. Marvin M. Mann, shot electrons of known speed from a hot filament at atoms in a vacuum.
