Peace Survey At Brown Indicates War Opposition

With 31,215 students from 101 colleges voting in the Brown Daily-Voted Student Peace Committee Survey on Peace, pronounced opposition for neutrality, withdrawal of American troops from China, passage of the billion dollar naval appropriations bill, and establishment of R.O.T.C. on optional basis, have been indicated. Results from the survey are not complete and further statistics will be announced later. Thirty states are represented in the tabulations to date. American withdrawal from China and application of the neutrality act has a 61 majority over collective action. The survey also indicated that Japan, in the United States, in the Far Eastern question, in the question of a permanent U. S. peace policy, neutrality requires exactly the same vote, while collective security ranks a little higher. Isolation still favors while the Spanish situation draws but little attention. Despite the pro-peace propaganda campaign, students did not support it as overwhelmingly as the school administration did.

Perhaps one of the most interesting results in the large vote in favor of peace was the strong opposition to the League of Nations, and for action by the United States leading toward the League. This is the first time that progressive disarmament particularly as for aggressive collection of security either through economic or military sanctions.

The R.O.T.C. issue brought forth tremendous majority for optional drill only, with only a few votes cast for compulsory drill even in R.O.T.C. colleges as a whole. Abolition of the organization office was favored over establishment of compulsory drill.
