Duke Grant Is Largest

275 Employed

Receiving the largest N.Y.A. appropriation of any of the 40 colleges and prep schools in the state, Duke now has 275, or 93 of its student body employed on government jobs. This is an increase of 39 over last year's pay roll list.

These figures do not include a large number of jobs other than N.Y.A. positions, ranging from correcting exams to mowing lawns, which are filled by students in these positions. It is noticeable that only a relatively small number of women made application for jobs.

The majority of those receiving N.Y.A. help have been assigned to the library, information desk, gym, and Quadrangle Pictures. Mr. Clark S. Jordan and J. M. C. and 20 and some freshmen are being coached for them in the swimming classes.



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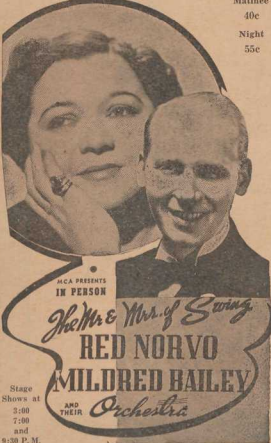
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
