## Clemson Dominates Conference Sports Activities in Raleigh

The name Clemson rose to the heights of the Southern conference sports when in Raleigh last week-end when the Tigers representatives on the basketball floor and in the swimming pool came away Southern conference champions in both these activities. The South Carolinians were undefeated in both tournaments, but showing a spirit and fire unsurpassed in Conference competition, they emerged victorious over the more highly-favored teams of other schools.

The same thing happened this year as last in the basketball tourney, only this year it was Clemson instead of Duke. The Tigers just managed to squeeze into the post-season play-off out of the goodness of the Conference committee, and then they proceeded to justify this unprecedented decision by capturing the title.

Before play began, Wake Forest was easily the favorite because of its great pre-tournament record, with Maryland's Old Lineers also conceded a good chance of coping the hunting. But, like last year, an outside team, "the Clemson team," came along and, put on the pressure, and defeated both the pre-tourney favorites and North Carolina and Davidson with the coveted crown. Any team that can come through four gruelling cage contests such as these deserves to win.

And thus ends Southern conference basketball for another year, and this is attested by the tremendous interest that was taken in this year's proceedings by fans, old and young. At almost every game, the gymnasiums were packed to capacity. Basketball has come into its own, and we don't mean maybe.

### Fate Takes a Hand In Caching Department

Well, now that basketball is over, we are naturally turning our eyes toward the baseball situation here at Duke. The miserable weather of the past week has put sort of a damper on pre-season workouts, but the men have been going through their paces as best they can. As usual, very little is being said to early. Everyone is just taking it easy rounding into shape after the winter lay-up.

However, even at this early date, Coach Jack Clemen is having his trouble through no fault of his own. It is in the catching department where Duke's Lady Fate has stepped into the spotlight. No less than three variety receivers are on the shelf for one thing or another. After Lovensmith got hit in the eye, "Tink" Holtzman sustained a bad ankle sprain while fooling around on the basketball floor, and Joe Morris, beaming over-anxious on a recent cold day, threw the ball a couple of times down to second, and now has hobbled up with a sore arm.

Thus, little Sid Frensdale is about the only one left for regular active duty at this time. Someone suggested they wrap this little man in cellophane which isn't such a bad idea after all, because if things keep going as they are, the team will be using the grandstand as a backstop.

Outside of this, everything seems to be progressing smoothly. There are something like 17 pitchers limbering up, and Coach Clemen, with a tough schedule staring him in the face, is looking around for two or three dependable starters. So far, though, none of the hunters have cut loose, and they are concentrating now on form and control until their arms get in shape for curve and fast ball tossing.

### Swimmers Finish Second To Taste Successful Season

Short note: This was probably the most successful season for the Duke swimmers in many a year. After winning all Conference dual meets, they finished a respectable second behind the strong Clemson tankmen in the Conference tourney. ## Six Meets Scheduled on Duke Court

### Mermen Finish Behind Clemson In S. C. Meet

Duke's lone first taken by Emmett In Tie With Young

Duke university's varsity swimming team placed second in the Southern conference tournament, which was held last Friday and Saturday at Raleigh. Clemson captured the conference title with 39 points. The Devils took 29 points, closely followed by V.M.I. with 28½ points. Seven records were broken during the meet, three of which were broken by Holtzendorf of Clemson.

Duke Emmett was the only Duke man to take a first in the Devils in the finals. He tied with Young of Clemson in the 150 yard backstroke event. In the 300-yard medley relay, in which a new record was set by the Clemson team, Duke's combination consisting of A. Shepard, Mole, and Jenkins placed second.

Emmett took second place in the 440-yard freestyle, won by Reynolds of State, and third in the 100-yard freestyle, won also by Reynolds who set a new record in the finals. The 400-yard freestyle, won also by Reynolds, and the 200-yard freestyle, made a new record in the first round of the 440-yard freestyle.
