

Peabody Elected Pan-Hel President

Engineer Chosen Vice-President

The Pan-Hellenic Council for 1939-40 will be led by Arthur W. Peabody, Lambda Chi Alpha, of Holden, Massachusetts, and George H. Dorsey, of Washington, D. C. who were selected yesterday afternoon to fill the political offices of the organization. Peabody, a senior at the University of Pennsylvania, will be treasurer. The secretary will be elected at a future meeting of the council.

Peabody, Dorsey, and Stetler were selected for their offices from a list of thirteen candidates who had been applied for to the interview committee, which consists of Dean H. J. Herring, George H. Dorsey, of Washington, D. C., and Charles E. Jordan, of the university administration. These candidates appeared before the committee yesterday afternoon for interviews.

Peabody has been active on the campus since his freshman year. He was elected president of the rising Senior class and president of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, and was also president of the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity, treasurer of 1939, and a junior representative on the Executive Council. Dorsey's selection as vice-president is a surprise, as he is the only one of the five Southeast state students ever to hold an executive position in the Pan-Hellenic Council.

Stetler, the new treasurer, is also president of Delta Sigma Phi fraternity and 1939, scholarship organization.

Pictured above are the gentlemen who have served as leaders in the 166 years of development of Duke University from Union institution. Reading in the usual order above are: Brantley York, Braxton Craven, John Franklin Crowell, John C. Kilgo, and William P. Few. York was president of Union Institute in Randolph county from 1813 until 1815. He was succeeded by Dr. Braxton Craven who served until his death in 1852. Professor Marquis Wood, not pictured, was the college's head for one year, 1851-52. John Franklin Crowell was the Trinity college head from 1857 to 1894. He was succeeded by Dr. John C. Kilgo who resigned in 1919. Dr. William P. Few was his successor and is now serving his 29th year as president of Duke University.

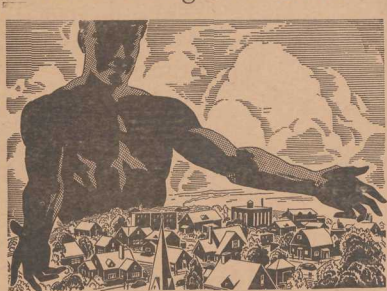
