100 Years of Growth

One hundred years ago Brantley York founded his now fanous school house in Randolph County. In 1859, through the untiring efforts of President Braxton Craven, Trinity college was originated. Came then slow years of development of this small institution. In 1892, through the efforts of President John Franklin Crowell and the benefactions of Julian S. Carr and Washington Duke, the college was removed to Durhau.

There followed then years of slow development under the guidance of John Carlisle Kligo. In 1810 William Con December 11, 1924, James B. Duke signed the indenture creating the Duke Endowment. The name of the college was resting the Duke Fondowment. The name of the college was changed to Duke university at the instance of President Few as a tribute to Washington Duke, the father of James B. Duke. From this time a period of unprecedented growth of the university took place, climaxed in 1830 when the present West campus, now known as Trinity college, was occupied.

The present year has seen the fitting commemoration of 100 years of progress. People of renown have paid tribute to Duke university and its growth. The university being completed. An addition to the hospital is now under construction. Ground for a new gymnastum is being problect. Scholarship and research funds have been secured.
