McDougall's Son Sculpt's In East Campus Garret

In a studio where pipes thrust through the floor in the most unexpected places and curtainless windows afford a dusty view of East campus lawns, sculptor Angus McDougall, whose studio this is, on the third floor of the Woman's college science building, is so interested in other sculptors and their work that it is hard to get him to speak of himself. But smiling, he will admit that "Yes, sculpture is my nature." Although his native land is England and he has spent most of his life in different cities of the continent, Angus McDougall seems perfectly at home, padding about his temporary studio in cardies through comfortable disarray. He has applied for a six-month extension of his stay.

At seventeen, young McDougall received his first serious instruction from the Russian Jewess, Basha Paef. Since that early teaching, his works have become well-known in Europe and in America. At Tenenbaum and Bill Thomas, the other two Rimplegar boys, ranged between mediocre and fair.

Jenny, the maid, played by Dorothy Butler, probably was a good characterisation, but it is hard to believe that anyone could be quite that dumb. The fault here lay more with the play and the directing than with the acting.

"Freddy" Gardiner, who was the heroine, did not do too well, and neither did "Chick" Dotter, the novelist, Jane Blackburn, as Kitty, was comparable to Miss Gardiner and Mr. Dotter.

"Bob" Marshall, the young doctor, played his part capably.

The scenery was carefully executed and was perhaps one of the best features of the production.

On the whole, "Three-Cornered Moon" was considerably inferior to the average production of the Duke Players.

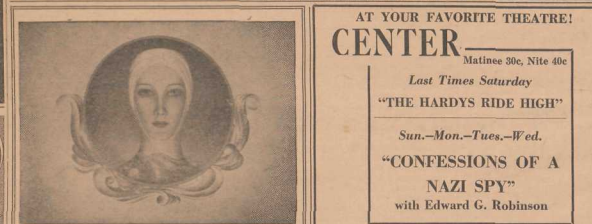
