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AMENDMENT WILL BE PROPOSED AT STUDENT MEETING

Suggested Change in House of Representatives Approved by Student Government

HOUSE PROVES TOO BIG

The members of the Men's Student Government association of Duke university recently proposed an amendment to the constitution of the association. This amendment will be brought before the students on April 21 at the general assembly in order that a discussion can be held concerning this new feature. After the discussion, the students will vote on the passage of the amendment. The proposition will do away with house representatives, who, due to their great number, are unable to cooperate effectively. A body of six men will take over their positions and probably will be able to accomplish more for the welfare of the students. In order to pass this amendment, a two-thirds affirmative vote will be necessary. If the plan is passed, it will go into effect next September. It is proposed that section 3 article 4 of the constitution be struck out, and the amendment below substituted for it:

ARTICLE 3

1. The membership of the house of representatives shall consist of six men elected by the members of the Men's Student Government association.

2. The members of the House of Representatives shall be elected on the general election ticket of the Men's Student Government association and the six having the greatest number of votes shall be considered elected to this body. Candidates for the house of representatives are subject to the rule of article 1 section 1.

3. The house of representatives shall have jurisdiction over such cases as are delegated to it by the student council, and shall be empowered to enact legislation as is prescribed by article 1 section 2.

4. The house of representatives shall have the power to enforce its legislation by some organization deemed suitable by that body.

Representatives of Forty College Publications Will Meet in Greensboro April 21

Reports from the committee on arrangements of the N. C. C. press convention point to a successful affair. The meeting, sponsored by the North Carolina College for Women of Greensboro, is scheduled for April 21, 22, and 23, being Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, of next week. It will be attended by representatives from 40 magazines, newspapers, and annuals throughout the state.

During the three days of convention, a program of speeches has been provided by leading journalists and opinion-formers of current problems of college journalism will be held. There will also be several social functions to entertain the delegates.

Ed Thomas is president of the state organization, and, as such, will be one of the leading figures at the convention. The new editors of all the publications will also be present at this meeting and election of new officers will be held.

Not much has been known heretofore by the student body in general about the reference room in the library and the duty it performs in aiding the students. This is one of the most valuable features in any library and Duke has a very extensive and rapidly growing department.

about 3,000 pamphlets which are U. S. government publications, and these are classified in boxes under the names of the various cabinet departments and their subordinate bureaus.

The reference collection is provided on open shelves in room 208 of the library. Four attendants handle and interpret the collection of books. This department was organised in 1860 when the new library was first put into operation.

Library reference service is a new phase in library work. Fifty years ago there were no reference departments for assistance to readers in college or public libraries. Along with this deficiency the attitude of administrative officials was such that librarians and themselves kept out of the way of readers as much as possible.

Today the reference department is the center of activity and its work is directly concerned with supplying information and aid to readers engaged in

The books that make up the Duke reference collection are encyclopedias, biographical works, dictionaries, bibliographies, atlases, and an international collection of "Who's Who." The reference books cover all the fields of knowledge and are most of them practicable for ready reference. All these books are kept on open shelves and are not al-

DUKE TRACKSTERS COMP OVER CATS TO EASY VICTORY

Brownlee Brings His Season
Total to 45 Points by Get-
ting Three Firsts

FINAL SCORE 18 3 1/2 TO 4 1/2

Davidson Sticks Close Until Last of
Meet When Devils Pull
Away

Displaying a sudden spirit in the final two events the Blue Devil tracksters emerged victorious over the Davidson Wildcats here Saturday afternoon by the score of 18 3 1/2 to 4 1/2. John Brownlee led the team with his usual 15 point total to bring his individual number of points to 45 for three meets. The Duke star outran the Wildcat's brilliant sprinter and runner, Hinkle, in leading his team to their third consecutive victory.

Second to Brownlee in scoring honor was Henry Palmer with 11 points. Palmer captured the quarter mile and the broad jump and placed third in the century. Lewis ran a fine mile and a few minutes later finished second in the two mile event. With four events to go Duke led 41 to 36 and the Devils swept the half mile, shot put, and javelin throw and 5 1/2 points in the pole vault to run up their score. The latter part of the meet was held in a drizzling rain which prevented any possibility of record ties. In winning the meet the Duke tracksters captured ten of the fourteen first places to show marked superiority in nearly all the track and field events.

The Blue Devils will have a rest period this week-end in preparation for their next meet the following Saturday with Washington and Lee there. The approaching meet with the Generals is expected to be the largest encounter so far this season for the Duke elder athletes.

IMPS LOSE FIRST MEET TO CAROLINA

Williams Breaks Varsity Shot
Put Record With Toss of
45 Feet 7 1/2 Inch

The Duke freshman track team lost the opening meet of the year to the Tar Babes of Carolina Friday afternoon in Chapel Hill. The final score was 74-60, the meet being very close throughout. The Carolina Fresh put on steam in the mile and the Tar Babes' mile runner, Tarsall, Blue Devil sprinter, ran a ten flat hundred to easily capture that event. Williams broke great form in the shot put and threw the iron ball 45 feet 7 1/2 inch to better the varsity record at Carolina. Berry turned in a fine quarter mile and he defeated the Tar Babes runners. The broad jump and high hurdles proved disastrous for the Blue Imps as Carolina swept all three places.

The most exciting race of the meet was the mile run. Reichenow of Duke was heavily outnumbered by a Carolina runner who had stepped a beautiful mile in flat time.

The Blue Imps will bet a second opportunity to meet the Tar Babes later in the season on their elder cluder path.

NETMEN TRIUMPH IN OPENING MEET

Wake Forest Wins Only One
Match as Devil Raquetters
Display Power

With a team including three sophomores, who underwent their first five of season tennis, the Blue Devil court season was opened on April 8 when the Duke netmen stormed the courts of Wake Forest to take a net 7 to 1 win.

Rained out of their first match with Boston College, scheduled to appear March 31, the 1932 edition showed surprising strength in their initial meet. After displaying their wares in the North-South tournament at Pritchard early this week, the Gregory-coached players will face the invasion of Richmond college who come here Saturday.

In the Wake Forest encounter the lone victory taken by the Deacons was captured by Vernon, ranking Southern player, who disposed of Garber by scores of 8-5, 6-3, 6-4. The Duke man won the first set, but was forced to relinquish his lead in the closing two sets. Defeat from the hands of Vernon is no disgrace, because he is the only college player to have extended Hines, of Carolina, to an extra set.

The three Duke sophomores—Welch, Norwood, and Martin—all won their matches in straight sets. Welch stopped Fletcher, 6-3, 6-3; Norwood defeated Hutchins, 6-3, 6-2; and Martin won from Buxton, 6-3, 6-2.

Peake, of Duke, ran through Bryan, 6-1, 6-1. Better, of Duke, was extended by Glen but broke through Glen's service in the third set to win, 6-3, 5-7, 6-3. The double matches, in which the chief problem is the return of service, were all won by Duke. Norwood-Welch won from Vernon-Fletcher, 6-4, 6-4. Garber-Peake defeated Hutchins-Nyon, 2-6, 6-3. The third doubles match called because of darkness.

Duke tennis fans were given an unusual opportunity to witness excellent play this week, when Bill Tilden gave an exhibition at Raleigh, and the North-South tournament was conducted at Pritchard. The Blue Devils had four official representatives in the Pritchard tourney—Garber, Welch, Norwood, varsity men; and John Higgins, freshman player. Several other students also entered unattached.

TECHMEN DEFEAT DEVIL SWIMMERS

North Carolina State's swimming team defeated the Duke tankmen 54 to 29 handily in a dual meet held in the Frank Thompson gym pool at Raleigh on Saturday. After the meet a water polo game was staged between the two schools with State coming out on the long end of 5 to 0 score.

The Techs had little difficulty in winning as they captured seven of the ten first places. Sippel in the 400 yard dash, Lawler in the breast stroke, and the medley relay team composed of Schaef, McCannly, and Fowle, took the only win for the Blue Devils.

YOUNG PLANS FOR ANOTHER VISIT TO EUROPEAN SOIL

Professor in French Department Served in Canadian Expeditionary Forces

AUTHOR AND TRAVELLER
Since 1923 He Has Been Conducting Tours on the Continent; Itinerary Includes Turkey, Greece, Italy, etc.

Dr. Edward H. Young of the French department has been to Europe twenty-five times, and is planning his twenty-sixth trip for this summer. His experience on that continent has covered several fields. He has been to Europe frequently since 1923.

During the world war he served in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in France as a member of the staff with the rank of captain. By virtue of his co-operation with the French language, he was soon transferred to the British forces in Egypt. There he was a material aid in the purchasing of supplies. He resigned later back to the Canadian forces, he saw service on the entire Canadian front. He was connected with the preparation of maps for combat purposes. Dr. Young was later decorated by the Canadian government with the "Victoria Medal."

Shortly after his return to the United States he went to Czechoslovakia to assist in educational work. On this trip he prepared two foreign language text books and collaborated in the preparation of another. He was appointed on the Inter-Alleied Higher Committee and assisted in holding the publicists in Alsace and elsewhere.

Since joining the faculty of Duke in 1923, Dr. Young's connections with Europe have been in conducting tours. His itinerary for this summer, which he looks forward to as much as if it were his first European trip, includes ten countries.
