Mulligan Plans Show Tuesday

The world's best baritone saxophonist, according to most critics; and most courageous pianist, according to Gerry Mulligan, will hit the Indoor Stadium Tuesday night at 8:15.

The Gerry Mulligan Quartet will feature Mr. Mulligan and Bob Brookmeyer, trombonist, backing each other in the traditional jazz combo interplay that set the pattern for the growth of big-band sections.

Even with two of the "mournfullest ranged instruments in jazz, Mulligan Quartet can get the funniest things going" according to Willis Conover conductor of "Music U. S. A." on the Voice of America. Their witty conversation with music is an extension of their onstage manner.

Mulligan is the unifying force of the Quartet. He can organize a jam session, his saxophone suggesting lines for the other horns to play, so that every musician is playing like an orchestra section, yet with complete freedom.

Fragile Toughness

"The essence of Gerry Mulligan and his music is at once fragile and tough, ricocheting from the intellectual to the humorous to the hostile." This is Mulligan, according to critic Conover.

Mr. Conover says that Mulligan's own artistry puts him occasionally at the head of the consistently "name" big band. The band is his own, but it doesn't refuse the Basie feel or the Ellington colors, the legacy that Mulligan acknowledges.

Mulligan's appearance here is a presentation of the Student Union major attractions committee. Tickets for the concert are now available from committee members and at the West Campus Bus Stop at \$1.25 per person.

On Tuesday tickets will cost \$1.50, selling at the door after 7:30. Buses will leave East Campus from 7:30 p.m. until showtime.

Council Votes New Hours for Frosh Lounge

The freshman cabinet has decided to close the freshman lounge "after the Late, Late Show" and re-open it at 8 a.m. every day.

The cabinet took this action because of recent malicious damage costing \$100 to repair. The destruction included tearing the covers of approximately seven chairs, according Philip P. Lader '66, Trinity College freshman class president.

Mr. Lader stated that the damage occurred after midnight February 7. The lounge was closed until the freshman cabinet could meet that Sunday. It was reopened Monday.

In December, \$150 of similar damage was repaired, but Mr. Lader called the second incident "more serious," because less of the damage was due to carelessness. He did not believe that any member of his class was responsible for the destruction.

According to a statement by the cabinet, the lounge will be closed for the remainder of the semester if any further malicious damage occurs, because further financial loss will over-extend the class budget.

The house presidents have discussed this action of the cabinet with all members of the freshman class and a mimeographed statement of the cabinet's position has been issued.

Sink Installed

Humm Resumes Botany Class

Dr. Harold J. Humm resumed classes in Botany 103 yesterday after a sink was installed in his classroom in the Biological Sciences Building.

The associate professor suspended the class February 11, until the Administration provided a sink for a course which he claimed used more glassware than any other lab in the school.

W. E. Whitford, director of operations, said that Dr. Humm's suspension had "nothing to do with the installation of the sink." He added, "I didn't know anything about the suspension."

The main portion of the classroom, which is used as a laboratory, contains nine sinks. The sink in question is located in a preparation room opening off the main laboratory. The original blueprints for the building called for moving in a sink from Dr. Humm's old laboratory. He said, "The old sink was better than the one we have now." Mr. Whitford claimed he had been told that the old sink was no longer wanted.

Mr. Whitford stated that Dr. Humm had not decided on a specific sink this fall and that he had been unable to act until he knew exactly which sink Dr. Humm wanted. He said Dr. Humm had been conferring with a member of his staff since August.

Dr. Humm signed a request for a certain model sink for his room in January. The sink arrived at the warehouse here January 31. The delay in installation, according to Mr. Whitford, was caused by difficulties in obtaining an appropriate cabinet for the sink.

Mr. Whitford averred that Dr. Humm had been informed that the order for the sink was placed January 23. Dr. Humm said the sink should have been in the building in September.

Faculty members contacted in an opinion survey on Dr. Humm's actions either refused to comment, or gave guarded approval. Provost R. Taylor Cole declined comment.

West To Pick New Officers

West undergraduates begin pulling levers at 8 a.m. tomorrow in order to decide who will fill some 30 elective student government posts for next year.

Up for election will be Men's Student Government Association officers, MSGA Senate members, class officers, members of the Religious and Radio Councils, the Publications Board, and the chairman of the pep board. Polls close at 7 tomorrow evening.

This year, for the first time, polls will be placed on the main Quad near the bus stop, if weather permits. MSGA president John M. Markas '63 predicted at least a 20 per cent increase in voter turnout as a result of this change. Turnout in the past several years has averaged about 60 per cent of eligible male undergraduates, with the freshman

class invariably showing up strongest in the number of voters.

Another Markas administration innovation this year is February elections. The Senate voted to move elections from the traditional week after spring vacation to late February in order to give newly elected officers more time to learn the ropes.

Another change in the elections this year will be the inclusion of candidates for pep board chairman on the voting machines. These candidates petitioned for their nomination instead of going through the usual party procedures.

Inadvertent Deletion

Senate Views New Angle For Getting Sandwiches

The Senate of the Men's Student Government is considering a proposal by the Null and Void Coffeehouse to provide West Campus with sandwiches on Sunday nights.

The subject of Sunday night snacks on West has been battered between the Senate and the Administration because the West Dope Shop is closed Sundays and the chow men—who used to appear six nights a week, including Sundays—disappeared last year. Allen Building has rejected MSGA's bid to open the Dope Shop Sundays with a promise that more vending machines will be installed in the indefinite future.

"Quite A Bit Of Meat"

Null and Void proprietor Allan Ross '61, now a Divinity student, furnished president John M. Markas '63 with a sample sandwich which the Senate reviewed Monday. The 35-cent ham sandwich on rye had four ounces of lean ham. Mr. Markas said "it appears quite attractive to me. Quite a bit of meat too."

Mr. Markas announced that Herbert J. Herring, vice-president for student life, advised him to have Theodore Minah, dining halls director, check out the Null and Void's health and sanitation status, and to check with J. D. Wellons Jr., manager of University Stores, to insure that the proposed operation would not interfere with his vending machine plans.

Senators expressed contempt with the idea that Mr. Wellons' operation should be allowed a monopoly. James L. Kennedy Jr. '63, independent senator, said "this Wellons has a monopoly on everything from Coke to books. You'll never see a sandwich like this in a vending machine."

Mr. Markas stressed that any arrangement with the Null and Void would be temporary for this year only.

Student Concessionaires

To avoid the Administration's ban on off-campus vendors selling on campus, Null and Void would operate through student concessionaires. Mr. Markas stressed that students "would not be allowed to hawk their wares." The chow men's nightly shouts and disruption of West caused their demise, according to Mr. Markas.

Upchurch To Run East FAC Program

M. Stuart Upchurch '64 will serve as chairman of the East Freshman Advisory Council for next year.

A history major from Raleigh, North Carolina, Miss Upchurch was an FAC in Jarvis this year. A spring training program for the new FAC's will take place sometime in April and will last about five weeks. Its aim is to acquaint the FAC's with all facets of University life. Miss Upchurch stated. The FAC program hopes to "orient freshmen to the tone of the University," she added.

A committee consisting of Dean Jane Philpott, this year's FAC chairman H. Elizabeth Gwynn '63, and Miss Upchurch will formulate plans for the spring training program.

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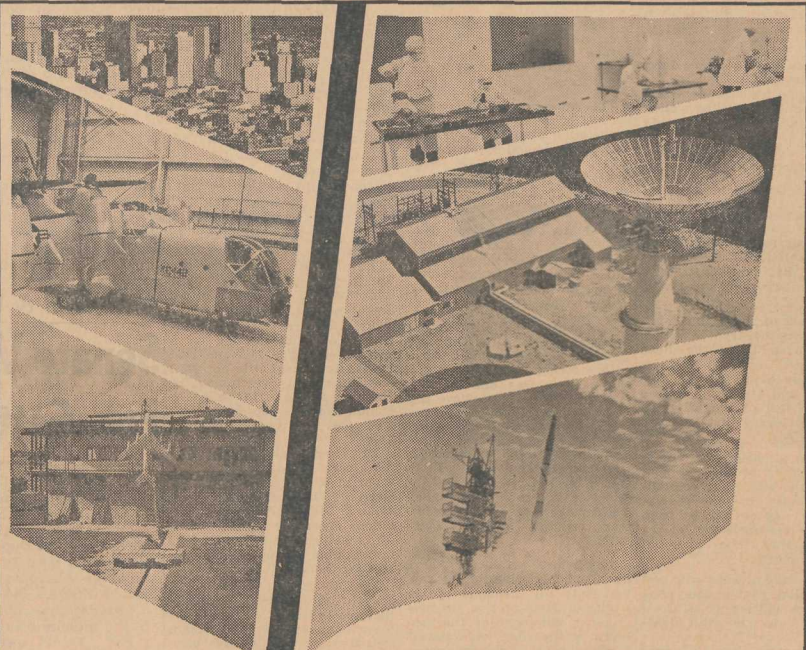

The next program in this series will be a March 5 recital by Edgar Fischer, cellist, and Paul Jacobs, pianist.

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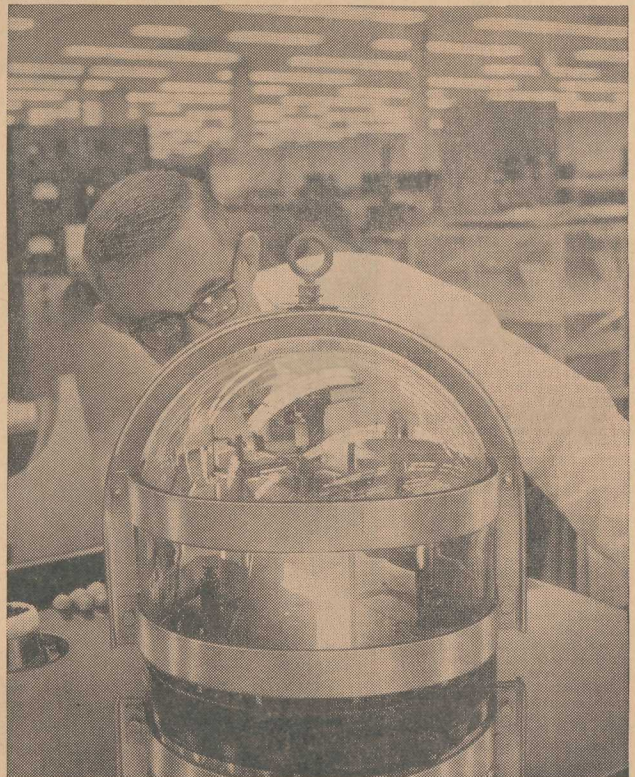


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Letters to the Editor

Editor, the Chronicle:

The puerile melange of malignment, misstatement, misunderstanding and naivete inflicted on any unfortunate reader of Timothy Anna's letter in Tuesday's Chronicle is, as Miles Davis has said in another context, "beyond category."

The one instance in which he descends from his Panglossian garble to something approaching intelligent coherence is perhaps more revealing than even Mr. Anna himself realizes.

He refers to "our own poor play-acting," summarizing, in what was either a subconscious insight hidden under all the pious gabble or a coincidentally happy phrasing of a few simple words, the entire general character of the Men's Student Government Association. Its placid acceptance of the University's insistence that it be allowed to act in loco parentis; its lack of concern with the really important issues that concern the student body, both on campus and off; and its feeble and ridiculous attempts at self-justification have, despite Mr. Anna's nonsense, earned it the overwhelming amount of indifference it now somehow puzzledly wonders why it enjoys.

MSGA Alienates

It is in this well known context I made my statement about the "dirtiness" of the party conventions. As to being realistic, the only people who are supremely unrealistic are the ones who would dare to claim that the present MSGA, organized as it is, alienating for this reason anyone who might be capable of improving it, could possibly be expected to perform the role (and it is not play-acting, Mr. Anna) that an MSGA should, not ideally, but logically and reasonably, perform on a University campus.

Mr. Anna states, "we have an MSGA today which is growing every minute in its sphere of responsibilities and powers." What he really means is that we have an Administration, which is reluctantly willing to grant concessions that are both long overdue and shameful in their very necessity.

Hope Left

It is for this reason that there is an area of hope for a worthwhile MSGA, and it is for this reason that the type of MSGA that we now have, and that Mr. Anna wants, may be more than inane and annoying; it may be tragic. It will be up to the MSGA in the time ahead to channel this willingness into really important and constructive achievements, to press for things that may seem visionary. It is also necessary for the MSGA to justify the responsibility it is asking for by showing it can fruitfully use the responsibility already vested in it.

In other words the only sour grapes we shall all taste, and they shall be sour ones indeed, are the ones that shall be forcefully thrust into our mouths if Mr. Anna and men of his general outlook get, or rather retain, control of the MSGA.

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Raybin Misses Mark

In regard to the letter from Mr. Raybin (February 15), by advocating changes in the MSGA, he seems to have missed the point. The offices of the MSGA are only positions of prestige, and the MSGA has no appreciable power over me as an individual student. Indeed, the MSGA with power in its hands would be a terrible image and a threat to individual freedom. But, we all know that any real power lies with the Administration, and rightfully so.

This is the important benefit of our political system here at Duke. It offers the power-seekers their chance to bask in the limelight of popularity. On the other hand, it gives those students occupied with intellectual endeavors the opportunity to study without interference by petty politicians.

I, of course, expect to be contested on this matter, for no fool likes being called one — so let them step forward! To those fed up with the MSGA, I recommend abstention in the elections, and to Mr. Raybin, I wish a speedy recovery after being "shocked" past several substrates of firmly established realism."

Center is on East, there may be no space for an addition.

A location between campuses on Myrtle Drive has been suggested. Some fear this would leave the Center neither here nor there.

There is some sentiment toward closing the gap between campuses, however. My faculty source favors the construction of faculty apartments. He points out there is probably no one site on Myrtle sufficiently large to house the Center. In addition it is anticipated that within a few years two thoroughways will bridge over Myrtle.

A decision on the Arts Center's location will be needed soon. The Mary Duke Biddle Foundation has already given the University a "substantial" amount of money toward its construction. It is likely that the Center will be built in several stages, and an accelerated program could see the first stage come into reality within two or three years.
