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


Judith Anne Ford finds the Miss America crown almost too much to bear

Once again it was that Most Special Night in Atlantic City—the Miss America finale—and raising the event to new heights of implausibility was Judith Anne Ford, 18, of Belvidere, III. Without dislodging a tress of her blond hairdo she displayed the routines (preceding page) that already had won her the title of junior national trampoline champion. It was the judges' turn to flip and they proclaimed her Miss America. There were dissentsnot to Miss Ford in particular but to the whole concept of the pageant.
